# Tokyo International Roses & Gardening Show

was privileged to be invited to judge the rose horticultural entries at the five day International Roses & Gardening Show held in Seibu Dome in Tokyo, Japan, May 19-25, 2005. Attended by more than 250,000 people over the five days, the quality of the exhibits were of exceptional caliber, especially roses bred in Japan. I would urge all delegates attending the World Rose Convention in Osaka to strongly consider the post tour to Tokyo which will include a visit to the Seibu Dome to view this extraordinary event. In 2006 the hosts will be featuring the WFRS Hall of Fame winners!

Osaka, Japan, May 11-17, 2006


Iwas privileged once again to judge the Tokyo International Roses and Gardening Show held in the Seibu Dome, May 18-24, 2005. Their chosen theme for 2005 was "The Secret Garden" and the display was nothing less than stunning! Next year the show will feature the WFRS Hall of Fame winners and the show has been included in the post-tour of the convention to Tokyo. This is an event not to be missed when you come to Japan next year!

At "Opening Ceremonies" I delivered a short address thanking the hosts and introducing two new show awards (see President's Remarks on page 2). On the first day the judging of the container grown roses takes place and an astounding 250 entries were received in three categories (hybrid teas,

floribundas and miniatures). The overall winner was a remarkable miniature tree rose of "Little Artist". Grand Prize winner of day two receiving both the WFRS Award of Excellence and the RNRS Star of Show was a beautiful specimen of 'Garden Party'. But the most impressive specimens were of Japanese bred roses such as 'The Passion', and 'Madame Violet'. Traveling each day to and from Seibu Dome by underground trains was easy with helpful maps (in English) in both the stations and trains. Somehow among the busy schedule I found time to attend a Grand Sumo Contest where I was surprised to find out that it was a family affair with many children and grandparents accompanying the parents to spend the day watching an intriguing sport, that of Sumo wrestling. It was a very enjoyable experience!

Later that day, a highlight of the visit to Tokyo was a trip to judge the Japan Rose Society trials at the Botanical Gardens at Jindi. The rose garden was in full bloom providing a magnificent spectacle for the visitor. This garden is featured in the post convention tour after Osaka and I highly recommend this garden be included in your visit to Tokyo.

After spending six wonderful days in the capital city of Tokyo, I moved by bullet train, called Shinkansen (an experience not to be missed while in Japan) to the ancient capital of Japan and home to many wonderful temples and shrines, namely Kyoto. The post tour from Osaka to Tokyo in 2006 will use this high speed bullet train to transport delegates offering them a unique experience in modern travel.

Arriving in Kyoto, I was quickly taken on a tour by Japan Rose Society Director, Mr. Tanaka, of some of the most wonderful temples and shrines. While in Osaka for 2006 WFRS delegates will have the opportunity to visit these shrines and temples, complete with wonderful gardens, as a day tour. Kyoto is only one hour away from Osaka. The day tour will visit the famous

Kinkakuji Temple, famous for its garden and featuring the brilliant Golden Pavilion and its grand Kyokochi Pond (mirror pond). I also visited the Kiyomizu-dera Temple where the main hall is built in a casade. The verandah, supported by 139 pillars without using nails, offers a magnificent mountain view of the city. Another temple visited was the Enkoo-ji Temple with beautiful serene gardens and a marvelous statute of Buddha. And perhaps the most exciting of all was the visit to

the Shugakiun Imperal Villa built in the latter half of the 17<sup>th</sup> century for Emperor Gomizumo-o. For those attending the Osaka convention, the day tour to Kyoto comes highly recommended.

# Former Governor Taku Kajiwara of Gifu Perfecture, Japan Receives WFRS Gold Medal

In presenting this prestigious award to Gov. Taku Kajiwara during the "World Rose Breeder Exchange Forum" on May 27-28, 2005 at the Nagaragawa International Convention Center, Gifu, Japan, WFRS President Dr. Tommy Cairns took the opportunity to personally present the WFRS Gold Medal during the reception at the Renaissance Hotel. Addressing the audience of assembled rose breeders from all the world, Dr. Cairns paid proper tribute to the man who had been both the architectural genius and also the action force in establishing the largest rose garden in the world in Kani City, Gifu.

Dear Hon. Taku Kajiwara:

Your election to Governor of Gifu Prefecture for the first time in 1989, pledging to implement the "Dreams of Tomorrow Project", heralded a new era in technological prosperity. In realizing a better life for your prefectural citizens through information technology, you also turned your attention to the social and emotional benefits derived from embracing the rose as a very special flower form.

In addition to your many professional achievements in life, your long love affair with Nature has been beautifully expressed in your book *Nagara no Kawakaze* (The Beauty of The Nagara River) and your command of song writing with the lyrics of *Shiroi Hana no Saku Furusato*" (Hometown full of Blooming White Flowers).

I am conscious that your motto for living life is *Sokuten-kyoshi* (Obey the will of Heaven, driven by the unselfish motives) and that the statesman you admire the most is the 19<sup>th</sup> century philosopher, Sakamoto Ryoma who preached a life free from personal ambition. However, the time has come to respectfully put aside such high ideals for a moment and honor a man who deserves our praise and reverence.

Taku Kajiwara, to recognize your outstanding services to the world of roses, I am pleased and privileged to announce that you have been awarded the "WFRS Gold Medal". I humbly offer my personal congratulations and know that you will wear this gold medal with honor knowing it came from the grateful 37 Member Countries of the World Federation of Rose Societies. Taku, we salute you! - A gentle and honorable citizen of Japan and an Eminent World Rosarian!

# "The Pacific Accords of Rose Friendship"

On Saturday May 28<sup>th</sup> 2005 the four signatories to this important treaty, namely Dr. Tommy Cairns for Rose Hills International Rose Trials, California; Kelvin Trimper for the International Rose Trials Gardens of Australia, Adelaide; Dr. Sam McGredy for the New Zealand Rose of The Year Trials, Hamilton; and Governor Hajime Furuta of Gifu International Rose Competition gathered in the Princess Hall Miyabi at the Flower Festival Commemorative Park in Kani City, Gifu Perfecture, for the formal ceremony.

The treaty has been established in a bid to promote friendship and exchange among the rose associations of the Pacific Rim countries that have organized international rose trials. Dr. Sam McGredy and Taku Kajiwara, the then Governor of Gifu Prefecture, made a proposal in 2000, which was supported by the other countries concerned. It was resolved that a signing ceremony be conducted on the opportunity of the "Gifu Flower Festival 2005" scheduled for 2005. The basic items agreed to in the treaty were the promotion of roses, interchange of perpetual trophies, visiting rose judges be granted to judge in each country and interchange on the evaluation of new varieties. Short speeches were given by the four participants prior to signing the two copies of the accords, one in Japanese and the other in English.

Later that evening Governor Furuta hosted a special dinner party to honor the signatories as well as the visiting rose breeders, Dr. Keith Zary (Jackson & Perkins, USA), David Austin, Jr. (Austin Roses, UK), Arnaud Delbard (France), Bernard Durand (Meilland, France), Georg Wieners (Tantau, Germany) and

Shunsuke Takeuchi (Keisei, Japan).





That day at Hana no Miyako Gifu, over 150,000 members of the public attended the gardens to view the roses in full bloom and witness the signing ceremony. The newspapers carried the story with a wonderful photograph of the four signatories (Dr. Tommy Cairns, Dr. Sam McGredy, Gifu Governor Hajime Furuta, and Kelvin Trimper) signifying their new friendship alliance by the holding of hands.

## International Educational Program for Osaka

The lecture program to be presented in Osaka has been successful in obtaining a wonderful geographical diversity of speakers for your pleasure and education. While the titles of the lectures have been published in the official program I have complied brief biographical sketches on the Lecturers:

Yuki Mikanagi, Ph D. (Japan)
Head researcher at the Natural History Museum and Institute, Chiba, and co-author of Flora in Chiba, has been engaged in chemical analysis of rose pigments in an attempt to determine the relations of species roses and to clarify the history of rose cultivars. She has visited many natural habitats of wild roses in Japan, and is known for her extensive knowledge of species roses and their natural hybrids.

Mikinori Ogisu (Japan)
Interest in traditional garden plants started in his teens. He widened his experience as a botanist in nurseries in Japan and botanical gardens in Europe. Since the 1980s, he has pursued research of wild plants in southern areas of China, which has resulted in many important findings, including the rediscovery of 'Rosa chinensis spontanea' in 1983. He was awarded the Veitchii Memorial Medal in 1996.

Yoshihiro Ueda, D. Agr. (Japan) Investigated natural habitats of species roses in various areas in East Asia while engaging in the research of rose breeding and in taxonomic studies of Genus Rosa at Chiba University and other institutes. He has published articles in many learned journals, and was one of the Editorial Advisory Board of Encyclopedia of Rose Science.

Hu Yonghong, Ph D. (China)
Trained in ornamental horticulture in various educational institutes, and engaged in research in evergreen perennials, Prunus mume, lilies, and chrysanthemums. One of his recent interests is in the selection of damp-hot resistant varieties of roses, and he has made extensive studies of species roses in the Yangtze River Valley.

Odile Masquelier (France)
Main interest is in old garden roses, founded the association "Rose
Anciennes en France" in 1995, and as its president, brought the 8th
International Heritage Rose Conference held in Lyon in 1999 to a
great success. In the same city, she owns a famous garden "La Bonne
Maison".

Gerald Meylan, D. Nat. Sc. (Switzerland)
Working as an independent consultant for environment, horticulture and landscape, and is at present the president of the Horticultural Society of Geneva. He has been the secretary-general of the International Rose Trials of Geneva since 1971, and also serves as the Chairman of the WFRS Awards Committee.

Ludwig Taschner (South Africa)
Glorious rose career started in Germany. He established Ludwig's Roses in Pretoria in 1971, which at present has a strong relationship with over 25 breeders all over the world, enabling him to select roses suited to the sub-tropical climate. He has held such important posts such as the President of the Federation of Rose Societies of South Africa, and the WFRS secretary and treasurer.

Stefan Wagner, Ph D. (Romania)
Engaged in research in fruit growing and rose breeding at the Research Station for Horticulture in Cluj for 40 years. He is at present the President of the Romanian Rose Society, which he founded in 1990. He received the WFRS World Rose Award in 2000. Besides many scientific papers, he has authored eight books including The Rose from Myth to the Third Millenium.

Josef Thomas, Ph D. (Czech Republic)
A physicist, engaged in research in the field of safety and radiation.
A rose fancier from 1964, he is interested in the history of rose growing and breeding in the Czech Republic and is now the President, and the Editor of the journal, of the Czech Rosa Club. He is also responsible for the International Contest of New Roses at Hradec Králové, Czech Republic.

Juraj Kuba (Slovakia)
Learned horticulture in the Agricultural University in Lenicana Morave, and worked in research of fruit and decorative wood plants. Since 2002, he has been working in the Slovak Academy of Science. He is going to discuss the history of rose gardening and rosarians in Slovakia, including the work of Joseph Geschwind and Mrs. Maria-Henrieta Chetekova.

Mahmooda Hashmi, PhD. (Pakistan)
Serves with the Pakistan Broadcasting Corporation. Her job is to plan, organize, and supervise broadcasts in 15 languages. She was the President of the Pakistan National Rose Society from 2002 to 2005,

and is also the lifetime editor of its Rose Annual. The great success of the WFRS Regional Convention held at Islamabad in April 2004 owes a great deal to her leadership and organizational skills.

Marijke Peterich (Bermuda)
President of the Bermuda Rose Society from 1994 to 1996. As the president, she was instrumental in the publication of the 2nd edition of Old Garden Roses in Bermuda, dealing with the topics she is going to discuss in her lecture. She presently serves as vice-president for North America of the WFRS.

Malcolm Watson (Australia)
Secretary of the National Rose Society of Australia since 2001. He served as the president of the same society and of the Rose Society of South Australia. For his outstanding service for the cause of the rose, he was awarded the Australia Rose Award (1999), the T A Steward Memorial Award (2000), and the World Rose Award (1993).

Katsuyuki Yomogida (Japan)
A 'perfumery chemist' who was engaged in the analysis of rose fragrances at one of the major cosmetic companies in Japan. His researches which cover 1000 different rose fragrances, have led to the discovery of many of their components, including dimethoxy-methylbenzene, and effects they can have on human psychology, and to the development of new perfume materials.

Jacques Mouchotte (France)
Served as Director of Research since 1974 for the illustrious French
House of Meilland International. Several of his varieties have been
awarded the AARS and other important prizes. Perhaps best known
for starting the new breed of roses, "The Romantica Series", first with
the introduction of 'Yves Piaget' in 1984.

Viru Viraraghavan (India)
Well known for the unique and innovative breeding programme he has been pursuing using Rosa gigantea and Rosa clinophylla for creating heat-tolerant and evergreen roses suited to the climate of India and other warm climate regions of the world. After retiring from his job as Director and Secretary, Agriculture and Horticulture Dept. of the state government, he has concentrated on rose breeding.

Zhao Shiwei (China)
Majored in ornamental horticulture and at present is working at
Beijing Botanical Garden. He is responsible for the project of creating
frost-hardy rose varieties by introducing genes of some species roses
native to the northern area of China. He is also the Secretay of the
Chinese Rose Society.

Yoshikazu Tanaka, D. Sc. (Japan)
Senior specialist working at the Research Centre for Application of Advanced Technology, Suntory Ltd. From 1990 to 1994 he pursued his research of genomic engineering with roses at Florigene Ltd. in Australia, and since then has played a leading role in introducing a blue rose with genes necessary for producing delphinidin transferred from pansies. He contributed a section on cloned genes to the Encyclopedia of Rose Science.

Kelvin Trimper (Australia)
Many years of gardening experience and has played crucial roles in important projects including the internationally-awarded Golden Grove Residential Development. He also served on the Board of the Adelaide Botanic Gardens, and is now the Chairman of the Management Committee of the National Rose Trial Ground of Australia.

Frank Benardella (USA)
Career in roses started in the 1950's, and since then he has always played a leading role in rosedom as an exhibitor, a judge, an award winning consulting rosarian, and above all, as a hybridiser of more than ten Award of Excellence winning miniature and miniflora roses.

Michael O'Loughlin, DHM (UK) A long and glorious career as a rosarian, judging at rose shows and trials around the world, and giving lectures on many important occasions in and out of the UK, including the prestigious Courtney Page Lectures he delivered in 2000. He was the RNRS president from 1997 to 1999, and acted as Chairman of the 2003 WFRS World Convention in Glasgow.

Hella Brumme (Germany)
Curator of the world renowned Europa Rosarium at Sangerhausen, which celebrated its 100th anniversary in 2003. Frau Brumme has excelled in maintaining the unique collection of old garden roses at Sangerhausen for posterity, building a database of the over 7000 varieties grown there. Currently, she is involved in renovating the gardens restoring the former glory of this rare repository of old garden roses.

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


